Extracts from the Paschal Message of the Ecumenical Patriarch, 2022

"We have come through the ascetic contests of Holy Great Lent, and experienced in devotion the revered Passions of our Lord; now, bathed in the everlasting light of His radiant Resurrection, we hymn and glorify His celestial name, crying out the world-rejoicing tidings 'Christ is Risen!'

"Resurrection is the central core of the faith, culture and hope of the Orthodox... Celebrating Pascha is not for the Orthodox a temporary reaction against the realities and contradictions of this world, but a manifestation of the unshakeable belief that He who trod down Death by Death, the Redeemer of the race of Adam, is (...) the God of Love, forever 'with us' and 'for us'. Pascha is the certainty of experience that Christ is the Truth who sets us free, the foundation-stone, the existential axis and horizon of our lives. 'Apart from me you can do nothing' (John 15: 5). 'No circumstance, or tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or pestilence, or nakedness, or peril, or sword' (Romans 8: 35) can separate the faithful from the love of Christ. This unshakeable conviction inspires and strengthens our creativity and our willingness to act in the world as 'fellow workers of God' (1 Cor. 3: 9). He guarantees that in the face of insuperable obstacles and stalemates, whereby Man's judgement no solution is attainable, there still exists hope and prospects. 'I can do all things in Christ who strengthens me' (Philippians 4: 13). Through the risen Christ, we know that evil, in any of its forms, does not have the last word in the progress of humanity.

"While filled with gratitude to the Lord of Glory for setting Man in a position of honour and supreme worth, we are grieved by the spectacle in our times of many forms of violence, social injustice and the trampling of human rights. Today our joyful proclamations of the Resurrection and our shouts of 'Christ is Risen!' resonate simultaneously with the clash of arms, the agonized cries of the innocent victims of warlike violence, and the cries of refugees, among whom we find numerous innocent children. We saw the problems with our own eyes on our recent visit to Poland, where the principal mass of refugees from Ukraine has found shelter. We sympathize and suffer together with the devout and courageous Ukrainian people, who have a heavy cross to bear. We pray and strive for peace and justice for all who are being deprived of those rights. It is inconceivable for us as Christians to remain silent before the debasing of human dignity.

"The chief defeated party in all wars is the human race itself, which throughout its long history has never succeeded in abolishing war. War not only fails to solve problems; it creates new and more complicated ones. It breeds discord and hatred, and widens the gulf between peoples. We firmly believe that the human race is capable of living without warfare and without violence.

"The Church of Christ, by its very nature, serves as a vector of peace. Not only does it pray for the 'peace from above' and 'the peace of the whole world', but it stresses the importance of human effort for its consolidation. The principal

characteristic of a Christian is making peace. Christ blesses the peacemakers, who strive to bring into the world the palpable presence of God by depicting the peace which 'passes all understanding' (Philippians 4: 7) in the New Creation, the blessed Kingdom of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

"Pascha is a celebration of freedom, joy and peace. Raising our voices to hymn the Resurrection of Christ...we address to you all, honoured brothers and sisters and dearly loved children, a heartfelt Paschal greeting, invoking upon you the grace and mercy of Christ, the God of All Things, who by putting Death to death, bestowed on us eternal Life."
