#### From Fr Ian

#### Dear Friends,

This coming Sunday is the one on which we read the opening of St Matthew's Gospel — the passage which gives us a genealogy of Christ. For many this is the most boring Gospel of the year, especially when it is read in an older English with the word "begat" occurring so often. I remember as a Deacon being instructed to read the section with all the names quite quickly, and then slow down when I got to the story, "the interesting bit". I now believe this to be a mistaken approach. Matthew's genealogy is carefully designed to tell us that Jesus was Jewish, that he was the promised king descended from David and that his coming brought to completion God's saving work for the whole of humankind; and that this was all accomplished through the birth of a real human baby.

At Christmas we see how far God is prepared to go to bring us back to him. The baby Jesus, who, like all human babies, has to grow both physically and mentally (see Luke 2:52), reveals a God who is willing to become utterly vulnerable "for us all and for our salvation". But it is not just at Christmas, or even at Christmas and Easter, that we see the vulnerability of God. Not too long after we have finished the Christmas celebrations in February, we will be reading the Gospel of the last judgement from Matthew 25, in which we hear the risen and glorified Christ telling us that it is him we meet in the poor, the sick, the imprisoned – in short in all the vulnerable people we see around us.

This Advent we have not been able to take up our usual charity collection as a community, and two periods (at least) of lockdown have left many of us more aware of our own vulnerability and fragility. But this gives us two challenges. First, to continue to see Christ in the vulnerable people we know and meet, and second, to recognise that in our own vulnerability we, too, are sharing in the life of Jesus who takes our illnesses and carries our diseases (Matthew 8:17). In our weakness, which is his weakness, we are called both to serve others and to let ourselves be served. Let us live this truth at the heart of our celebration.

In keeping with remembering the vulnerable during Advent, Fr Ian recently received a letter sent to all the North Oxford and Wolvercote churches by NOAAH (North Oxford Action Against Homelessness). He asks parishioners to consider sending them a charitable donation as part of our Advent preparations. Homelessness and aid dependency are likely to rise after the pandemic, so they are anticipating a greater demand on funds in the coming year, and are appealing to local churches for additional support. NOAAH has helped rough sleepers into accommodation and it has also assisted those who are struggling to remain in housing in a number of different ways — by making grants to help with unpaid bills, by supplying essential household items for people recently housed, and by paying for vans to move household goods. This organisation has no staff and no costs which means all the money raised goes directly to people in need.
