From Fr Ian

Dear Friends,

As we know the Church's New Year, following the Roman/Byzantine tax year and the agricultural year, begins in September. For those who live in the academic world, or in places where that world is of particular significance (such as Oxford!), this may still have some resonance. But for most of us, following the pattern of the Roman civil year, the "real" New Year's Day is January 1st. And so it is not out of place for me to wish all of you a happy, prosperous, peaceful and, above all, healthy new year.

In the year that has gone we have been forcibly reminded of how fragile our life together, and even life itself, can be. We have learned to appreciate the importance of our social bonds in a new way, precisely through being deprived of many of their normal forms of expression. Mental, emotional, spiritual and physical contact with others has become something that we have come to value in new ways, and even those of us who, at the outset of the pandemic, thought ourselves self-sufficient have in many cases come to learn how much we depend on others.

There has also been a shift in many people's value systems. It is not that long ago that parents would threaten their children that if they didn't do well at school they would find themselves working in the local supermarket, as if that were a position to be scorned. Yet last summer we found ourselves on our doorsteps, applauding these same supermarket till operators and shelf stackers as "key workers", while those with what had seemed the "better" jobs found themselves on furlough. We enter 2021 with some signs of hope, but still in the grip of an international crisis.

As I write this we are still permitted to come together to worship in limited numbers (although for our Community the need to safeguard people from possible infection has meant that we have had to cancel a couple of Liturgies). But we do not know what the future holds, nor when we will be able to return to what we took for granted as "normal". Thinking of a New Year message I found myself returning to the words of Minnie Louise Haskins, famously quoted by King George VI in his 1939 Christmas broadcast:

And I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year: "Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown." And he replied:

"Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the Hand of God. That shall be to you better than light and safer than a known way." So I went forth, and finding the Hand of God, trod gladly into the night. And He led me towards the hills and the breaking of day in the lone East.

May this be true for us all in the year ahead.
