HEARING GOD'S WORD IN ALL ITS FULLNESS

Eight days after the Resurrection, on Thomas Sunday, the Lord graciously condescended to appear again to the disciples 'when the doors were closed.' But the Book of Acts, read today as throughout the whole period of Pascha, reminds us of another appearance, also 'when the doors were closed,' of an angel in the gaol where the Apostles were imprisoned (John 20: 26). The Angel dispatched by the Lord proceeds to liberate them, at the same time exhorting them, as they make their way out, to 'Go and stand in the temple and speak to the people all the words of this Life' (Acts 5: 20). The heavenly visitor laid emphasis on speaking 'ALL the words,' meaning that the Word of God should be presented without abridgements and without selective interpretations of the truth of the Gospel: 'Everything you know, everything the Teacher taught you, everything which the Holy Spirit has brought to your minds and illuminated for you, all of that you are to proclaim and teach accurately and in entirety.'

In our times there are people who do not want to hear the word of God in all its fullness. For example, some feel annoyed when the Gospel speaks of prayer, sacrifice, the Cross, self-denial, Christ as judge of the world, the Last Judgement, Hell, resurrection of the dead, and so on. These individuals prefer to restrict the preaching role of the Gospel simply to the improving of interpersonal relations, a kind of socially-oriented Christianity. There is no doubt that this tendency constitutes a serious deviation from evangelical truth; it is a fallacy. If the Word of God is offered in any form other than its authentic purity, the laity will sense it and reject it. Our Lord's statement is clear: '... the sheep follow him, for they recognise his voice. A stranger they will not follow, but they will flee from him, for they do not know the voice of strangers.' (John 10: 4-5). Christ is not interested in merely making us morally superior, once the goal of a variety of social, philosophical and religious systems throughout human history. Rather, the goal of Christianity is salvation, *soteria*, deriving from the adjective *soos* or *sos*, complete, whole, 'safe and sound.' In fact, the ultimate aim of Christian salvation is for Man to achieve unity (*enosis*) with God.

There is, however, a contrary tendency. Certain people are attracted to a merely theoretical hearing of the Word of God, to acquiring knowledge of the means of salvation and of theological truths, Meanwhile, however, they undervalue the importance of keeping the commandments, and fail to engage in the practical struggle necessary for the Word of God to bear fruit within their souls. According to St Gregory Palamas, they are lovers of spectacle, lovers of discourse, but not lovers of virtue. As St Gregory justly observed, 'practice is the stepping-stone to theory.' We should not undervalue practice, but neither should we disparage theory.

Since the angel of God urged the Apostles, after their miraculous liberation from prison, to 'Go and stand in the temple, and speak to the people all the words of this Life,' let us be ready and willing to hear the words of the Gospel in their wholeness, without diminishment or mutilation. In truth, what is the point of possessing theoretical knowledge of spiritual life, if in practice we are spiritually impoverished? Let us start out by faithfully observing the commandments so as to advance steadily forwards on the spiritual road of illumination, towards the consummate perfection that has no end, described by the holy Fathers (e.g. St Maximos the Confessor) as 'everlasting completion and ever-moving stillness.' Amen.
